

Graduate Student Award | Publicly Engaged Scholarship

Deadline: December 9, 2023

In recognition of graduate students actively working in publicly engaged scholarship in the humanities (Theology, History, English, Philosophy, and Languages, Literatures, and Cultures), The Center for the Advancement of the Humanities (CfAH) is accepting applications for the Publicly Engaged Scholarship Award. Graduate students whose scholarship actively engages broader (non-academic) communities and/or communicates research to the public beyond academia are encouraged to apply.

Award recipients will be honored during Grad Week, February 19-23, 2024 and receive a financial award. Students interested in being considered for the award should submit their application to andrew.kim@marquette.edu by December 9, 2023. Please write "PES AWARD APP" in the subject line and submit all materials as attachments in the same email.

*Proposals will be evaluated according to student leadership and initiative, success actively engaging broader (non-academic) communities and/or communicating research to the public beyond academia, and potential for public impact.

Student applications <i>must</i> include both:	And <i>one</i> or <i>both</i> of the following as appropriate:
A one-page cover letter explaining what function you think public scholarship in the humanities ought to perform, and how your scholarship performs this function.	Proof of work (this could be anything like pictures of artwork, public lecture(s), community service, etc.) that demonstrates how your scholarship is situated in a publicly engaged way and/or communicates your research specifically to the non-academic public.
CV (2 page max.) containing your publicly engaged scholarship in the humanities highlighted in yellow. The CV should include work pertaining to traditional academic scholarship as well.	Letter of recommendation that speaks to the quality of your work off campus (recommendations should come from someone working in close proximity to your work as a publicly engaged scholar—site coordinator, editor, faculty member that directly participates in/oversees your work and letters submitted to andrew.kim@marquette.edu by December 9).
