From the Professor of Military Science

Alumni, Family, Friends and Cadets of the Golden Eagle Battalion,

What a great opportunity to send out this quarterly newsletter right after Easter! A time where we all reflect and learn from history and continue to reflect, learn, and develop ourselves. Our program and Cadets have had incredibly great news this past semester, they have learned immensely, and have developed phenomenal leadership skills.

First, YOUR program was recognized as the 2nd best program in the 3rd ROTC Brigade, that's equivalent to a sweet sixteen nationally of 275 Army ROTC programs. This was a result of a lot of hard work and consistent success at many levels to include winning the training and operations category.

Second, both the 9 person and 5 person female Ranger Challenge Teams won their respective category at the 3rd ROTC Brigade Competition. That is the first time both teams have won. The great news of this is our 9 person team gets to advance to Army West Point (USMA) for the international Sandhurst competition that will pit 60 teams from across the globe against one another on April 8 and 9, come out and cheer us on! Our team is one of eight ROTC teams invited; equivalent to an elite eight. Marquette University recognized this team at the last home basketball game of the year.

Third, we've had other teams fare very well: Notre Dame Basketball Tournament (Men's -2^{nd}) and (Women's - Final Four); and, Northern Warfare Competition at UW-Lacrosse (5th and 6th). UW-Milwaukee's Ranger Challenge Team placed 3 of 15 teams at the Task Force Competition, an impressive feat with only 30 Cadets to select from!

Fourth, we received a winter slot for Air Assault Course, where Cadet Kempka excelled and earned the coveted wings.

Finally and most importantly, we conducted our most precious and important alumni event; Veterans Day Wall of Fame Induction and Contracting Ceremonies on 11 November. We were honored to induct Colonel Christopher DeMeulenaere, a 1985 Marquette Physical Therapy Program graduate, onto our Wall of Fame. Furthermore, we formally contracted 35 Cadets in front of their Parents and Families!

Another exciting note, we received significant donations from our alumni to enable us to work with Marquette University to install a Rappelling anchoring system that will allow us to rappel our Cadets off of Memorial Library for many years to come. Thanks alumni for all of your donations, each donation helps our Cadets in many ways and truly supports our Cadets in becoming the most confident and prepared leaders our Army has to offer.

We are extremely proud of our outstanding Cadet Leaders and all they have accomplished and are about to accomplish to further prepare each for commissioning and many summer leadership opportunities. This semester we'll continue to prepare our Cadets for success and thriving in chaos with the following events: German Armed Forces Proficiency Badge Challenge, Combined Leadership Development Exercise (LDX), Spring LDX, Ranger Buddy Challenge at the University of Kansas, and 12 Cadets will travel across the Globe for Cultural Understand and Proficiency Program and 2 for Project GO to Oman, I for Airborne, I for Air Assault, 3 will do Nurse Summer Training Program, 20 will attend Cadet Leader Course and another 18 will attend Cadet Initial Entry Training. Wish them all luck! They will come back well trained and ready to bring their skills to the Golden Eagle Cadets!

I must thank the Golden Eagle Battalion Family Action Network for their incredible contributions to the program. They have enabled our extended family to bond and truly make our program the best FAMILY in the Army. Without their leadership and efforts we would not be the strong and resilient FAMILY that we are! We are so very thankful for your time and donations that greatly benefit **your** Cadets!




Family Action Network (FAN) Club

Task Force Ranger Challenge

The Golden Eagle Battalion participated in the Task Force Ranger Challenge at Ft. McCoy, WI. The Battalion sent 4 teams out to compete, comprising of a 9-person team from Marquette University, a 9-person team from UW-Milwaukee, a 5-female team from Marquette University, and two 5-man teams from Marquette University. The Golden Eagle Battalion Cadets performed wonderfully and culminated with sweeping Task Force Ranger Challenge as the 9-person team won seven of the ten events and the 5-female team won nine of the ten events; both teams took first place. The 9-man team from UW-Milwaukee took third place. The 5-man teams from Marquette University took second and third place. Both the 9-man and 5-female teams from Marquette University advanced to the Brigade Ranger Challenge the next weekend.

Contracting Ceremony



Shadow Days is a unique opportunity for high school seniors to experience what Army ROTC in college is like. In the fall we had 16 students shadow some of our current Cadets and in the spring we had 14. During Shadow Days the shadow student arrives on a Thursday morning and are paired with an current Cadet. The Shadow and Host conduct Physical Training together as well as experience college classes together for the day.

Shadows also had the opportunity to learn Weapon Assembly and Disassembly of M16, Basic Rifle Marksmanship (BRM), and Engagement Skills Trainer (EST) in the Golden Eagle Battalion's Unit and a local Wisconsin Army National Guard Armory. The shadows received a class from current Cadets about all the vast opportunities and unique activities that the Golden Eagle Battalion has to offer. The shadows were able to experience Milwaukee's off-campus dining for an evening to allow them to see what the city has to offer.

Friday morning the shadows attended Leadership Lab with their hosts. The shadows were able to experience labs on first aid, army litters and casualty transportation, and enter and clear a room. Shadow Days is a great way for high school students to see if ROTC is a good fit for them and to further inspire interest within our great program here in Milwaukee.




