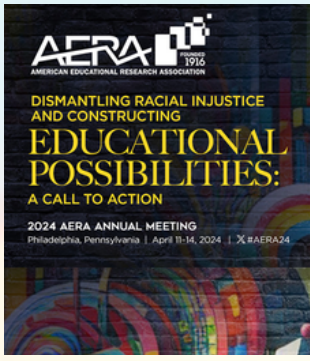


EDPL FACULTY TO ATTEND AERA 2024 FOR LONG-TERM RECRUITMENT PURPOSES

THE LITERARY & CULTURAL HISTORY OF ANTI-VACCINATION

Anti-vaccination so often gets discussed as if it were a modern problem of the relatively recent or even immediate present: as anti-science/pseudoscience, as religious fundamentalism, as neoliberal choice, as the dangers of Big Pharma. But these claims often become explicitly ahistorical: debates over the efficacy and legitimacy of vaccination, as well as its potential effects, dates back to its inception as a medical practice popularized by Edward Jenner in the late 1790s. Turning to the late eighteenth-century and early nineteenth-century vaccination debates, **this talk explores the role of literature and visual culture as they were mobilized by proponents both for and against vaccination.**

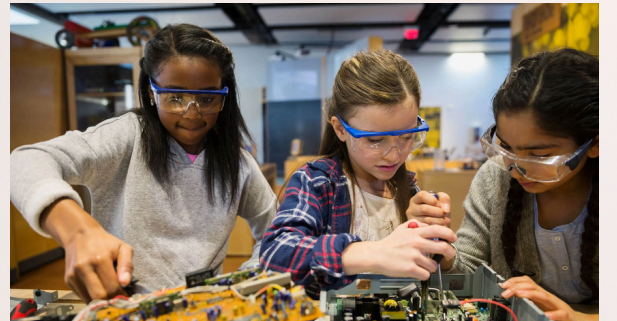
