History:

1886-present	Jesuits (Oregon Province, Portland, Oregon) established and have administered St. Mary Church (Chelan, Entiat, Methow, Nespelim, Nez Perce, Okanogan, Paloos, Sanpoil, Senijextee,
1886-1973	and Wenatchi), Colville Reservation Jesuits (Oregon Province, Portland, Oregon) established and staffed St. Mary School (Chelan, Entiat, Methow, Nespelim, Nez Perce, Okanogan, Paloos, Sanpoil, Senijextee, and Wenatchi), Colville Reservation
1907-1908, 1909-1914	Pascal Sherman (Okanogan) attended St. Mary School
ca. 1907-ca. 1912	Christian Brothers (then Martinez; now San Francisco Province, Napa, California) briefly shared administration of St. Mary School
1908-1936	The Lady Missionaries of Mary, also known as the "Lady Catechists and Missionaries" and "The Madams" (Omak, Washington) staffed the school
1936-1965	Sisters of the Third Order of Penance of St. Dominic (Immaculate Heart of Mary Province, Kettle Falls, Washington) staffed the school with 3 former Lady Missionaries of Mary [later as the Spokane Dominicans they merged with the Dominican Congregation of the Most Holy Rosary (Sinsinawa, Wisconsin)]
1965-1973 (transferred to a community corporation)	Lay teachers staffed the school
1973-present	St. Mary School was renamed Pascal Sherman Indian School

Jesuits from St. Mary's attended St. Joseph Mission (Chelan, Entiat, Methow, Nespelim, Nez Perce, Okanogan, Paloos, Sanpoil, Senijextee, and Wenatchi), Omak, Colville Reservation, 1945-1979 (became a parish).
